## Pastor's Paragraph

I recently received a letter and packet of materials from our bishop related to our quadrennial boundaries training and clergy health as related to the pandemic and other stressors. There's nothing unusual about that. It happens at least every four years. What I find intriguing are the first two sentences. "Dear colleagues in Christ, I am very aware of the strains you are under as you lead during a pandemic, unemployment-fueled recession, increasing partisanship and avoiding civil discourse. The world needs the church more than ever to offer hope and a third way of being." (Bishop Bob Farr)

Bishop Farr's assessment of our current malaise in America (and the world) is spot on. Unfortunately, the same issues the bishop decried are also prevalent in the church. The bishop did not define what he meant by "third way of being." Did he mean independent as opposed to Democrat or Republican? Did he mean Libertarian as opposed to liberal or conservative? Did he mean calmness as opposed to anger or fear? Does he mean Christian as opposed to humanistic or secularistic? Perhaps it's all of these. Perhaps it's none of these.

The bishop says three things in this sentence that I believe are crucial. One, the world needs the church more than ever. The church needs to quit fighting among ourselves and take our role seriously as the conscience of the culture. The church needs to be the example of sacrifice for the common good and of peaceful conflict resolution.

Two, the church must offer hope to the world. This pandemic has caused many churches to become monasteries. Do we need to be safe? Yes! But we also need to remember that the gospel is still "good news." That the gates of hell still will not prevail against the church Jesus is building. That we are still charged to go to the last, the least, and the lost. And that we still serve the King of kings and the Lord of lords, at whose name every knee will bow, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God.

The third thing is that the church must offer a different way of being in the world than we are experiencing right now. The world is broken. Fortunately, as Christians, we have a healing balm that can minister to the world's brokenness. Many of you remember and quote God's word to Solomon at the dedication of the temple: "*if my people who are called by my name humble themselves, pray, seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sins and heal their land.*" (2 Chronicles 7:14) The healing of our land will not happen because a particular political party or person gets elected to the presidency or the congress. Healing will come when we repent of our partisanship, divisiveness, racism, and judgmentalism. Healing will occur when we who love peace as a concept also put peace into practice as peace makers.

Romans 12:9-21 gives the best antidote to our current sickness I have ever seen. "*Don't just pretend to love others. Really love them. Hate what is wrong. Hold tightly to what is good. Love each other with genuine affection, and take delight in honoring each other.*"

*Never be lazy, but work hard and serve the Lord enthusiastically. Rejoice in our confident hope. Be patient in trouble, and keep on praying. When God's people are in need, be ready to help them. Always be eager to practice hospitality. Bless those who persecute you. Don't curse them; pray that God will bless them. be happy with who are happy, and weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with each other. Don't be too proud to enjoy the company of ordinary people. And don't think you know it all! Never pay back evil with more evil. Do things in such a way that everyone can see you are honorable. Do all that you can to live in peace with everyone. Dear friends, never take revenge. Leave that to the righteous anger of God. For the Scripture say, 'I will take revenge; I will pay them back,' says the Lord. Instead, 'If your enemies are hungry, feed them. If they are thirsty, give them something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals of shame on their heads.' Don't let evil conquer you, but conquer evil by doing good."*

We are also grateful to Go Green Team member Marcia Hornbeck for creating and donating new signage and a new realtor's box attached to the gate where we post copies of our *Guide to Recycling and Reusing in Stockton*.

The list of items accepted in our SUMC recycling cabinet is posted on the cabinet door. The list changes from time to time. Please check it before your leave items in the cabinet and do not leave items that do not appear on the list.

## **7<sup>th</sup> Dead Electronics and Appliances Recycling Drive a Success**

Despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and rather cool and windy conditions, on Saturday, October 17, an incredible group of 17 masked and safety conscious volunteers and a Meredith Recycling Company staff of four gathered in the church parking lot to conduct our rescheduled recycling drive. We welcomed four new volunteers and served 107 households.

We loaded 511 tallied items for transport to Meredith Recycling in Montrose, where they will be sorted for reuse or dismantled for recycling or appropriate disposal. Team members will distribute other items, such as 68 pounds of small batteries, a 5.25-inch stack of CDs, cardboard packaging, plastic bags, and a 4x4x8 container of EPS foam to other regional recyclers.

The Go Green Team participates in several activities each year that focus on reducing, reusing or recycling to protect and preserve God's creation. We appreciate the support of our congregation and thank all of our volunteers for the manner in which they individually and collectively worked so diligently and cheerfully to make this drive a success.

## Pollinator Victory Garden

The Church Council has approved the plan for a Pollinator Victory Garden at the south side of the parking spaces, in a part of the empty lot. This has been on the back burner for several years. Diedre Senecal, Susan Holt, and I have stepped up as Project Leaders to get this accomplished. The plans are to create a habitat for butterflies, bees, hummingbirds, and other pollinators in a more formal garden setting so that the community can utilize the space for prayer/meditation, education, and the enjoyment of nature. With pollinators in decline due to construction, widespread use of pesticides and climate change, as Christians we are charged to take care of the planet, including these small creatures.

We'll be working on a shoestring budget and plan to ask our Church members for donations of flowering plants and assorted hardscapes (bricks, edging, statues or other garden elements with a Christian or naturalist nature (sorry no gnomes), large and small rocks, stepping stones, etc.) - actually anything you have lying around your property that you have no use for and you think could be incorporated into the garden.

If it is a flowering plant, please also include where it is growing on your property (N, E, S or W side of your house or out in the open... shady, sunny, or partial shade.) ## Recycle All Light Bulbs, All Political Yard Signs, November 15, 18

For the sixth year, SUMC is participating in America Recycles Day, a nationwide initiative every November 15 by Keep America Beautiful.

Recycle all kinds of residential bulbs and political yard signs (steel stands, paper, and plastic signs) on Sunday, November 15, 9:30-10:45 a.m. or the following Wednesday, November 18, 2-4 p.m. Only two kinds of bulbs require fees:

- florescent tubes—\$1/tube
- compact fluorescents (CFLs)
- incandescent
- halogen
- light emitting diodes (LEDs)
- metal halide—\$2.50/bulb

Drive into the east portico for a masked Go Green Team volunteer to safely collect your bulbs and signs from your trunk or back seat. Please stay in your car and do not unload them yourself.

Carefully bag each CFL and metal halide bulb in a sealed zip-lock bag, one per bag. Save your brand-new bags and chose to use good used zip-lock bags available in the welcome area the first two Sundays in November.

Transport florescent tubes in the box the new ones came in (you can take your box back home) or carefully wrap them in newspaper or other protective material so they cannot slide out.

We cannot accept broken bulbs. For safety, we cannot store bulbs in the church at any other time, so please drop them off only on these days.


